Your Core Tenant Rights

Written Agreement

Outlines rent, deposit, maintenance, and termination terms clearly for both parties.

Fair Rent & Notice

One month's notice required before any rent increase. Challenge unfair hikes at the Rent Tribunal.

Right to Privacy

Landlords cannot enter your premises without giving proper advance notice.

Protection from Illegal Eviction

1–3 months' proper notice is required. Illegal evictions are punishable by law

Safe & Habitable Environment

Landlords must meet basic health and safety standards throughout your tenancy.

Deposit Recovery

Full refund at tenancy end, minus damage beyond normal wear and tear.

Legal Redress

File disputes with the Rent Tribunal for unfair eviction, excessive rent, or rights violations.

Addressing Common Tenant Challenges



Unfair Rent Increases

Start by negotiating directly with your landlord. If unresolved, file a formal complaint at the Rent Tribunal to challenge excessive hikes.



Unlawful Evictions

Report to the police or seek legal assistance immediately. An illegal eviction is a criminal matter and can be challenged in court.



Poor Living Conditions

Formally demand repairs from your landlord in writing. If ignored, escalate to your local housing authorities for enforcement.



Deposit Refund Issues

Keep detailed, dated records of all payments and property condition. Thorough documentation is your strongest asset in any dispute.



Know your rights — the Rent Tribunal is a free and accessible remedy for most tenant disputes in Kenya.

Legal Framework Protecting Tenants



Landlord and Tenant Act (Cap 301)

Covers protected tenancies for both commercial and residential properties across Kenya.

Rent Restriction Act (Cap 296)

Regulates rent for properties with monthly rent not exceeding Ksh 2,500.

Constitution of Kenya (2010)

Article 43 recognises housing as a fundamental human right for every Kenyan.

Land Act (2012) & Housing Bill (2019)

Offer additional layered protections for both tenants and landlords in modern disputes.
